Elizabeth Cleghorn Gaskell 1810-1865

The novelist and biographer Elizabeth Gaskell was born in London in 1810, but brought up by her aunt in Knutsford, Cheshire, after her mother's death in 1811. In 1832 Elizabeth married the Reverend William Gaskell, a Unitarian minister at Cross Street Chapel in Manchester. Four of their children, all girls, survived.

A remarkably independent, sociable and energetic woman, Elizabeth drew upon a wide range of experience in her writing. She was not afraid to tackle the pressing social problems of the day. Her literary output was varied, including many short stories, as well as *Mary Barton* and *North and South*, both dealing with the problems of industrial Manchester. She also wrote *Cranford* and *Cousin Phillis*, both set in Cheshire; *Ruth*, the story of an unmarried mother; *The Life of Charlotte Brontë*, a pioneering work of literary biography, and *Sylvia's Lovers*, a historical novel about Whitby.

Elizabeth Gaskell died suddenly in 1865, having almost completed *Wives and Daughters*.

The publication of *The Letters of Mrs Gaskell*, edited by J.A.V. Chapple and Arthur Pollard in 1966 marked the revival of interest in her work. This was supplemented by *Further Letters of Mrs Gaskell*, edited by John Chapple and Alan Shelston (2000). Jenny Uglow's biography, *Elizabeth Gaskell: A Habit of Stories* (1993) was a best seller. More recently, Alan Shelston's *Brief Lives: Elizabeth Gaskell* (2010) provides a fascinating insight into the author's life. Television adaptations of *Wives and Daughters* (1999), *North and South* (2004) and *Cranford* (2007 and 2009) have further widened Gaskell's following.

Our Events


We are a lively, active and very friendly society with a busy schedule, including:
